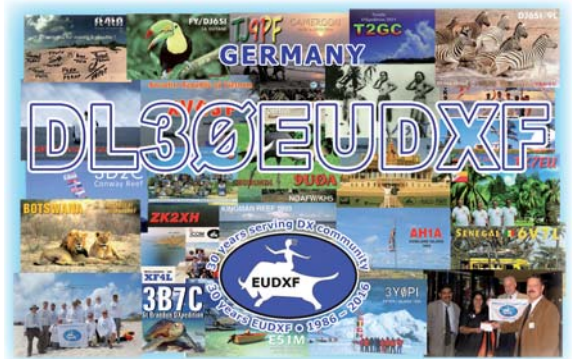
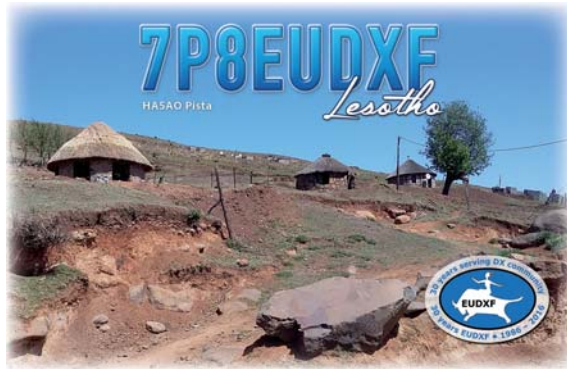
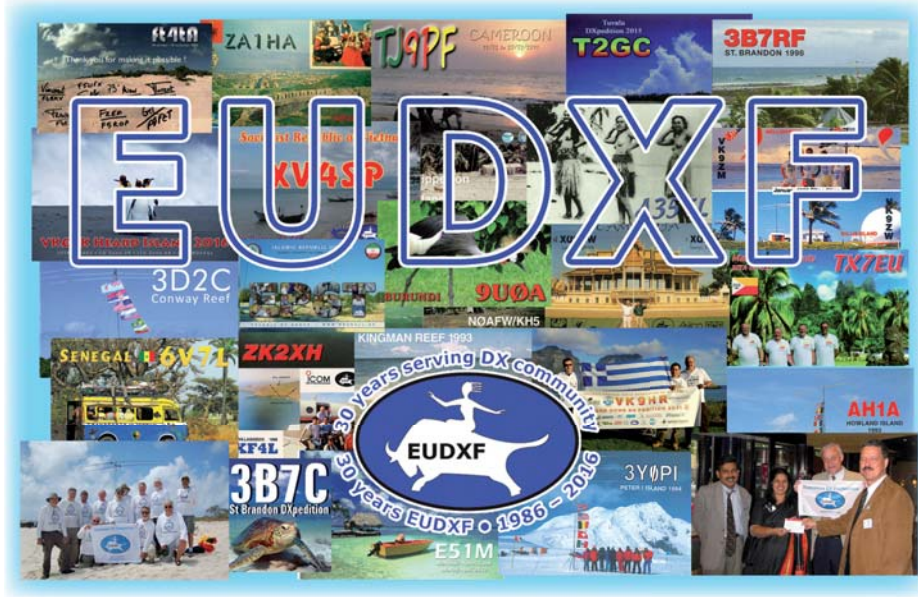

EUDXF NEWSLETTER JANUARY 2017

Dear EUDXF Members,

the year 2016 is gone and looking back it has been an exceptional year with outstanding DXpeditions such as VKØEK, VP8STI/VP8SGI, FT4JA, K5P, ZL9A, EP2A, CY9C, VK9CK, T31T, TX7EU, VP6J, H44GC/H4ØGC, D66D, ZL7G, ET7L, 3C7A, 3XY1T, S9YY or VU7MS to name a few. As the conditions were quite poor on the higher bands, remarkable activities and huge pile ups could be observed on the lower bands.

2016 was a very successful year in terms of DX. As you might have noticed EUDXF appears as sponsor of most of the mentioned major DXpeditions. It is thanks to the support of passionate DXers like you, the EUDXF members, that these high-budget DXpeditions became reality. I am sure that in return you were reimbursed by very exciting moments behind your radio chasing for the last missing DXCC entities or bandpoints. Isn't this what DX is all about? The little moment after years of waiting. Having spent hours of calling when your call sign is filtered out of thousands of stations and you can press the enter key and finally log the long-awaited new one? EUDXF will continue to support rare DXpeditions and let's see what 2017 will deliver!

2016 was also a year of changes as the EUDXF members had to vote for a new board and president. During the annual EUDXF convention held on August 27th in Bad Bentheim, Germany, the new officers were elected with Jan, DJ8NK, Achim, DF3EC, Hans, PB2T, and Ron, PA3EWP, as board members. Henk, PA3GCV, executive officer, Robert, DL1EBV, treasurer and newsletter editor, Jan, DJ5AN, stand manager and Alex, PA1AW, website administrator were confirmed in their current positions. Hans, PB2T, who has been EUDXF president for many years had decided to retire. On behalf of the EUDXF I would like to thank Hans very very much for all the great work he has done for our organisation in the past! I also would like to express my gratitude for your credit of trust in electing me as his replacement.

2016 was also a special year for the EUDXF as our organization celebrated its 30th anniversary. We are extremely happy that EUDXF members from different EU countries participated in this event by activating special call signs with 3ØEUDXF in the suffix. The introduction of the 3ØEUDXF Award created lots of interest and pile ups on all bands. By the end of the year a total amount of 72.925 QSOs has

been achieved! What a phantastic team effort and great advertisement for our organisation! Let's hope that this nice activity helped to attract new members.

Additional activities in 2016 were the total re-organisation of the EUDXF website. A big thanks to Alex, PA1AW, for his great work! Furthermore, a special discount could be arranged for QSL printing jobs for EUDXF members in cooperation with UX5UO printing services. The new mailing list is now active which shall provide EUDXF with an internal communication platform. New EUDXF membership flyers have recently become available and can be ordered from Robert, DL1EBV. I would like to encourage you to send these flyers along with your direct mail. Help us to make more advertisement for our organisation and be EUDXF ambassador in your home country! Because only as a large group we can achieve our primary goal which is supporting DXpeditions with a focus on Europe!

In memory of our friend Ivan, F3AT

On November 8th 2016 we were informed by Maurice, F5NQL, that Ivan Pastre, F3AT, of Saint Georges sur Baulche, France, one of the world's oldest radio amateurs and EUDXF Honorary Member became a silent key in the age of 102 years.

Ivan became a ham in 1931 and remained active as passionate CW operator for the rest of his life. First licensed as F3AU, he became F3AT a couple of years later, using a 100 percent home-built station. Over the

years, he also operated under various exotic call signs, including FQ3AT in French Equatorial Africa, FQ3AT/FE and FE8AB in French Cameroon, and FF8AG in French Sudan in the 1940s and 1950s. His FQ3AT operation marked the only appearance of the FQ3 prefix.

F3AT was at the top of the DXCC Honor Roll with 388 entities confirmed, and he held the 5-Band DXCC. He belonged to the First Class CW Operators' Club (FOC), Clipperton

DX Club and he was also on the roster of the A-1 Operators Club. Ivan joined the EUDXF as number 751 on the 1st of June 2003. When he communicated his birthday 07.04.1914 to the EUDXF office during a routine address check, he was immediately made a Honorary Member.

Our thoughts are with his family members. We will miss Ivan as a good friend and also his CW signals on the air. We will keep him in best memory. May he rest in peace!

I spent two weeks at Lesotho again, between 15 - 29 October 2016. The primary purpose of the trip was to deliver humanitarian aid and support to orphan children. I was providing clothing, shoes and school supplies.

I applied for and used the special call sign 7P8EUDXF in order to participate in the 30 year anniversary celebrations of EUDXF. I was on the air in my spare time and 4,027 QSO are in the log. The noise level on the low bands (160 and 80 m) was S7 to S9+, so there was no chance to work on these bands. The higher bands were not bad, except during the second week of my stay. There was a strong geomagnetic storm K=5-6 which had killed the propagation.

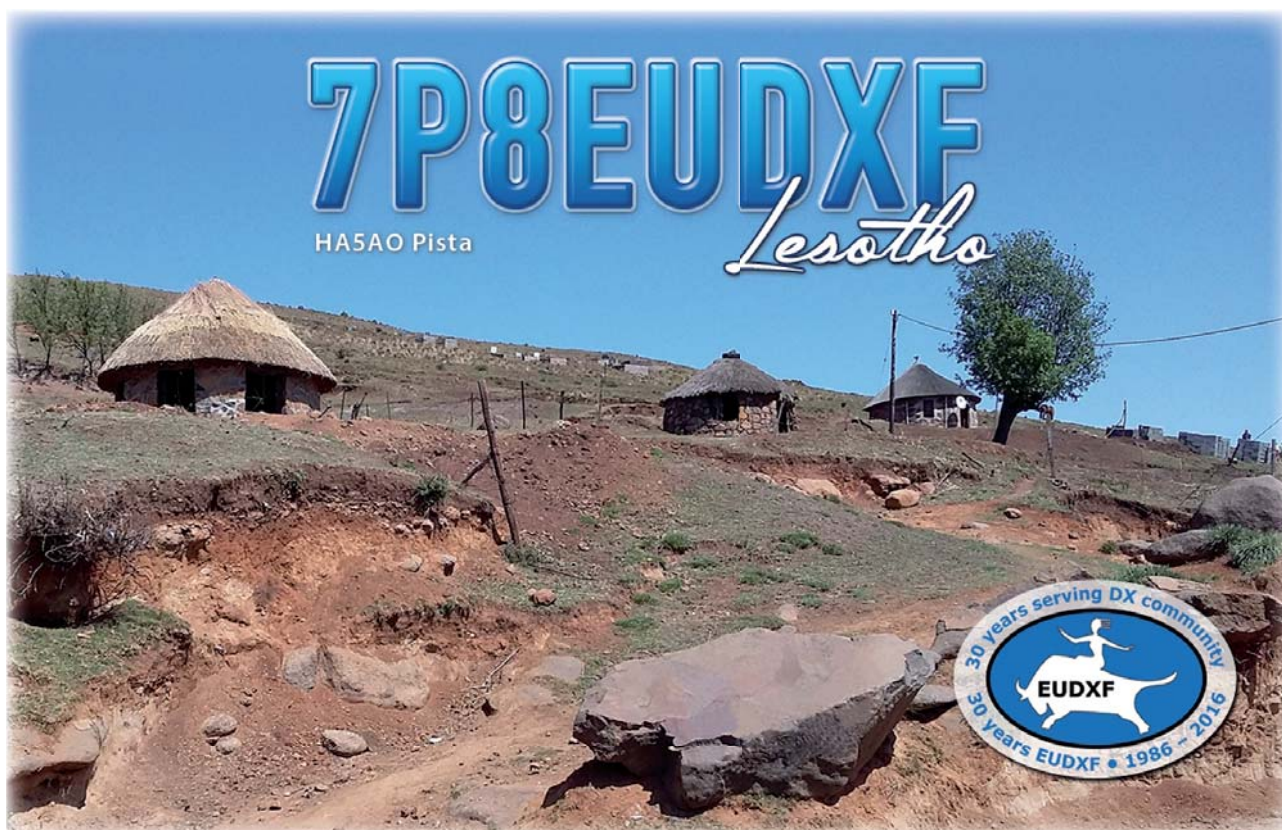

The DL3ØEUDXF Story

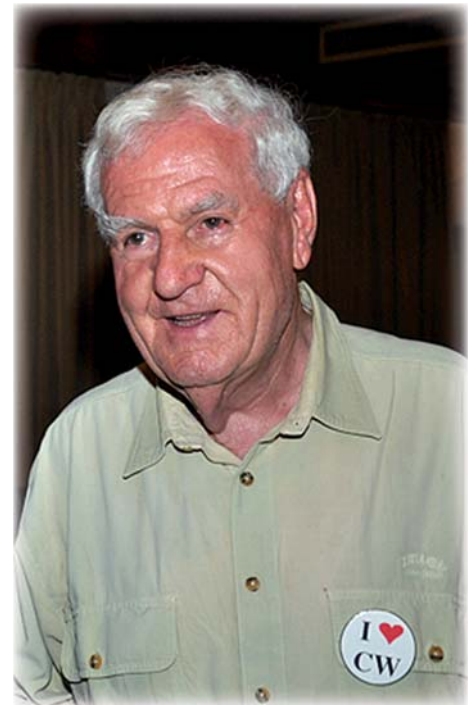

DL3ØEUDXF was the first special call sign dedicated to the 30th anniversary of the EUDXF activated by Baldur, DJ6SI, and his brother Joerg, DL4DCE. As more and more 30EUDXF stations became active towards the end of the year and the creation of the 30EUDXF awards program was announced, it was obvious that more operators were needed to offer DL3ØEUDXF on the bands. Until the very last day of 2016, DL3ØEUDXF was supported by Ralf, DJ1RP, Toni, DL1EKO, Dominik, DL5EBE, Olaf, DL7CX (participation in Stew Perry Contest on 160 m) and Sigi, DL7DF. A total amount of 8,912 QSOs was achieved by the German team from 10 – 160 m in CW, SSB and digital modes.

I always tried to activate DL3ØEUDXF in the morning before leaving for QRL and in the evenings when I came home and occasionally on the week-ends. Unfortunately, propagation were really challenging and as the higher bands were mostly dead, the biggest amount of contacts was made on the lower bands, especially on 80 m. As my spare time behind the radio was very limited I used to announce DL3ØEUDXF on the cluster whenever I started operation or whenever I changed the band. The introduction of the 30EUDXF awards program had resulted in wonderful

pile ups and it was remarkable how some DXers really tried hard to work us on as many bands as possible. By time, some call signs became really familiar to us and although signals were sometimes extremely weak, they were recognised and made their way into the log. Despite of the poor conditions I made frequent calls on the higher bands to check propagation. I was surprised that even on 10 m and 12 m during daytime brief openings on an apparently dead band had allowed me to work a couple of EU stations who were really happy to get this rare bandpoint. As DL3ØEUDXF was mainly activated on SSB, the focus of my operation was clearly set to my favourite mode CW.

There was a little downside during the activity related to my radio. My Ten-Tec Orion suffered from dying capacitors of the power distribution board and had to be sent to the repair shop. In the meantime I had to use my little IC-7000 mobile HF rig which couldn't compete with the Orion receiver quality at all which caused some frustration. But the biggest frustration came after I had asked the repair shop to make a firmware upgrade on the Orion. When I got my radio back it suddenly showed frequent ARC faults on the ACOM 2000A linear. These ARC faults were severe

on 80 m, but on 160 m I basically couldn't use the linear at all. However, DL3ØEUDXF was more or less active every day and those hunting for bandpoints in completion of their awards definitely got their chance. DL3ØEUDXF was a very nice team effort and I would like to thank all participants for their active contribution! Best 73s & gd DX!

During the year I noticed good activity on all bands with the special *EUDXF calls from many EU countries. Since I am also a member of the EUDXF foundation and were sponsored with DXpeditions of the Rock-all DX group (9Q5ØON and EP6T), I felt responsible to help in any way to activate Belgium with the special call ON3ØEUDXF. I requested the call in October, but had to wait until 2 December to get the license in my possession after many phone calls... I could only get a permit for one month, so I choose December. First I had to prepare the QRZ.com page with prepare upload to Clublog. Every ending days of activity I uploaded my log. I must say Clublog is the master in handling QSL requests! The activity was high in the first days. I was mainly QRV on 17, 20, 40 and 80 m because the activity was higher on those bands. After I was spotted, hell broke loose. After about 300 QSO's I switched mode to regain my pile up. After work a mostly worked to the west (USA and SA) before 17 and 20 was closing down. Than I had to stick to 30, 40 and 80, due to bad propagation. In the weekends I could be active early, but 10, 12 and 15 was a disaster, as many others could agreed with. So I had to start on 17m to have good pile ups towards the east. In total we (ON6CC & ON7RN) worked 4366 QSO's. We counted 132 dupes. Eric, ON7RN who is also a member had about 160 QSO's during the last days. Thanks Eric! It was my honour to have been working you all as part of the 30-thirtieth anniversary of the EUDXF foundation!

During an eye-ball QSO with Ronald, PA3EWP in the summer the idea was born to activate the 3ØEUDXF callsigns also from The Netherlands.

When I received a ready to go I decided to request for the PC3ØEUDXF callsign.

Unfortunately at that time my antenna tower was still out of order, and an exact date for replacement of the tower was still unsure.

Therefore I choose December as activity month for the special callsign.

Just a week before going on the air the old tower was stripped, removed and a new tower was placed.

All antennas had to be taken down by hand and put up again part by part, especially the Optibeam with all it's elements was a rather time consuming job.

With the new antennas finished just on time I started operation on December 1st.

It was a real pleasure to get the big pile-ups, up to 180 qso's an hour... really nice to handle.

Some other facts:

- for some still unknown reason my logging program (N1MM logger plus) decided to stop running RTTY... so had to stop with that mode
- my wife's alarm clock didn't like RF... after all kind of malfunctions I had to replace it in order to keep peace in the house... hi
- on a morning my wife came into the shack telling me that we got 'disco' outside... it turned out that the Christmas lights in a big tree outside proved to be a perfect RF indicator... even with the power cord disconnected there was plenty light when transmitting on 80 and 160 m. (no wonder, when putting LED Christmas lights 16 m vertical in a tree...)
- some other RF sensitive electronics discovered as well.
- my K3's power supply turned out to be not ok, causing the K3 to switch off suddenly while I was transmitting so had to replace it.

- Seems a lot of DX cluster operators these days, as often only after a spot people found me...
- I worked mostly simplex and that turned out to be ok most of the time as long as people listen.
- some people found it necessary to tune their amplifier right on top of me, and then calling me... easy recognizable with the K3's panadapter...
- or the guys working me 6 times on the same band/mode... why????
- last days of operation I discovered some sporadic-E openings on the higher bands; nice to see slothunters following me up and down the bands
- using such a long callsign on VHF turned out to be not a good idea as most VHF operators seems unable to handle more than six characters callsigns, hi

It was pleasure to give as much people as possible the chance to work PC3ØEUDXF on any band from 160 and up.

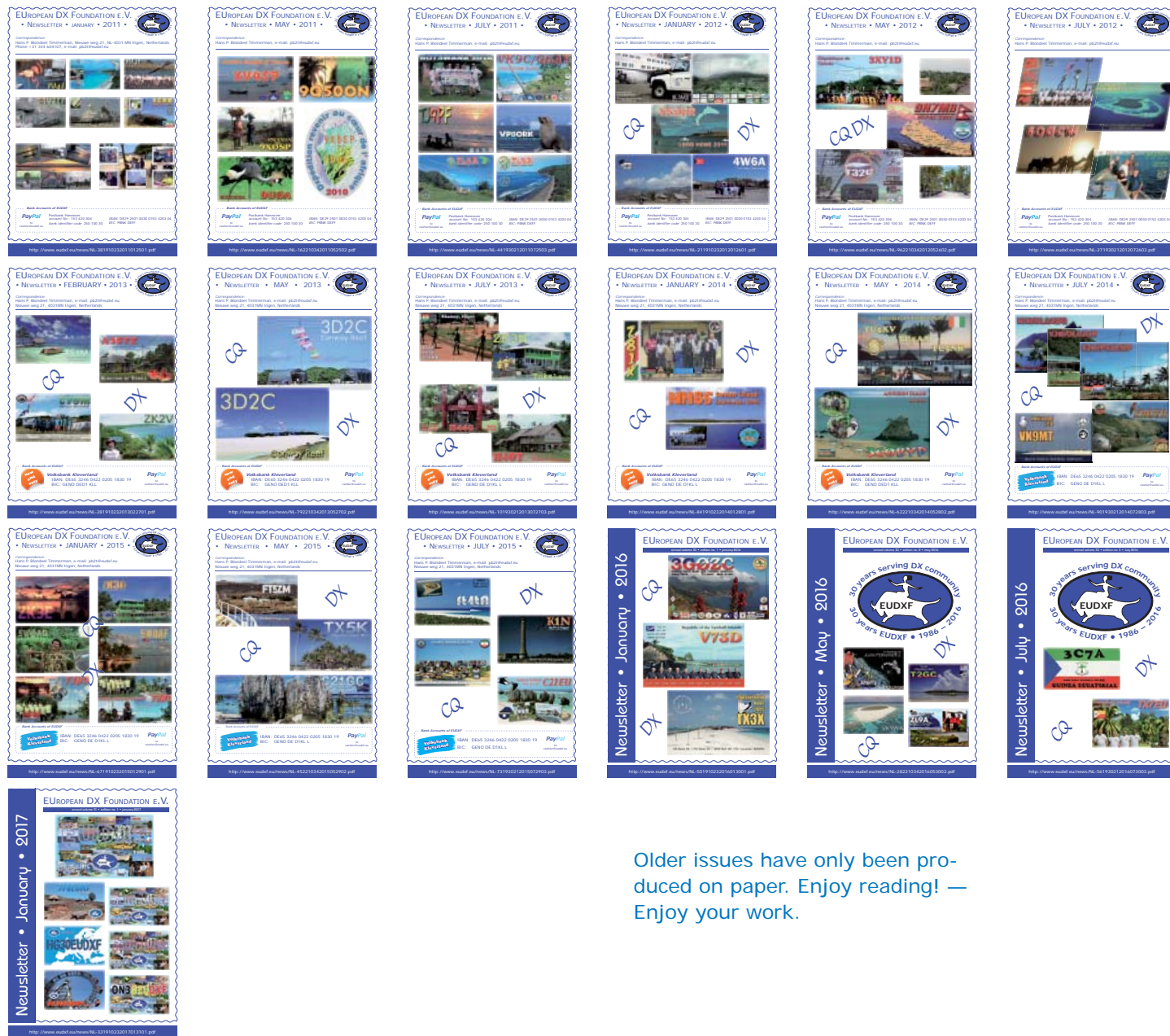
